Since then, we've incorporated all of darger Setnor choirs and e'veturned it into a major showcase

with this pandemic. Lanything, it's intensified, because we networked really be there for each other. I love the idea of spreading the light, taking it from the hardrick Chapel going out into the world

Peppie Calvar:

We just couldn't beany more excited about the international impact that the HendricksapelChoir is having. I'm just honored to be in the right place at the right time, eiven tright place happens to be 5,000 miles from here. My attachment to here is what makes it great.
